

WOMEN PATRONS OF ARCHITECTURE: DR. EDITH FARNSWORTH AND HER ICONIC MODERN HOUSE 3:30 P.M., APRIL 13



On Sunday, April 13 at 3:30 p.m. at the Atheneum Visitors Center (401 North Arthur St.), architectural historian Michelangelo Sabatino will discuss his new book, *The Edith Farnsworth House: Architecture, Preservation, Culture*, exploring the three distinct "lives" of the iconic modern house. Designed by Mies van der Rohe for Dr. Edith Farnsworth, the house has evolved through different phases of ownership and preservation, from its creation as a pioneering work of modern architecture to its later years under the Palumbo family and its current stewardship by the National Trust for Historic Preservation and Landmarks Illinois, which opened the house to the public 20 years ago.

Sabatino will be joined by contributor Ron Henderson to discuss the house's architectural significance, preservation challenges and cultural impact, while Diane Sanders, Assistant Director of Historic New Harmony, will read excerpts from Farnsworth's memoirs.

Copies of *The Edith Farnsworth House*, as well as Sabatino's other books, *Avant Garde in the Cornfields* and *Modern in the Middle*, will be available for sale at the Atheneum Museum Shop for signing following the program.

WINTER 2025 PHOTO ESSAY



2025 in New Harmony started with a winter storm. Snow blanketed the town for a few days in early January, turning it into a winter wonderland. This photo shows the Eigner and Weber cabins with the David Lenz House in the background.

While the Atheneum Visitors Center was closed for the winter, Historic New Harmony upgraded the building's 45-year-old HVAC system. This \$750,000 project replaced the old machinery with a new system that will be more reliable and energy efficient while providing a more comfortable temperature inside the building.



Collections manager Heidi Taylor-Caudill started a project to digitize Historic New Harmony's collection of Block Files in January. The Block Files contain photographs and information on people, places and events in New Harmony, Indiana, from the 19th century through at least the 1990s.



On January 20, collections manager Heidi Taylor-Caudill and maintenance staff member Christian Farley inventoried a large number of items from Historic New Harmony's collection stored off-site.



From January 11-February 22, the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art presented the exhibition, *Infinite Gauge: Makenzie Goodman and Adam Stacey*, featuring new works in sculpture and image-based media from the artist duo.



The New Harmony Interpreters' Association took a field trip on February 10 to John James Audubon State Park in Henderson, Kentucky. There, they received a behind-the-scenes tour of the Audubon Museum and discussed interpretation with museum curator Connor Humphreys. They also learned about connections between John James Audubon and the naturalists in the Owen/Maclure community in New Harmony.





On January 22, Historic New Harmony hosted the first meeting of the Owen/Maclure Bicentennial Committee with other organizations and individuals interested in planning a celebration of the 200th anniversary of Robert Owen's purchase of New Harmony from the Harmonists. This meeting was followed by a second meeting of the committee at the Working Men's Institute on February 27. Historic New Harmony (HNH) held its 12th Talking History gathering at the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art on March 20. Participants had the chance to view the exhibition, *Encountering: Io Palmer, Pavlina Vagioni and Anna Tsouhlarakis*, and examine items from HNH's collections related to trade and exchange. The discussion centered on the history of commerce in New Harmony.



Maintenance staff spent the winter working on various projects to preserve and maintain Historic New Harmony's properties. This included cleaning the



window shutters on the 1830 Owen House and replacing siding on the Joseph Neef House.

ENCOUNTERING: IO PALMER, PAVLINA VAGIONI AND ANNA TSOUHLARAKIS

New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art (NHGCA) proudly presents *Encountering: Io Palmer*, *Pavlina Vagioni and Anna Tsouhlarakis*, a three-person exhibition reflecting on themes of cross-cultural trade, exchange and diasporas. *Encountering* explores intersectional identities and cross-cultural frameworks over time: both themes simultaneously overlap with the overlapping histories comprising present-day New Harmony, Indiana. Works on view encompass sculpture, collage, assemblage and non-traditional art materials, foregrounding the ways in which approaches to material culture shift over time. *Encountering* offers timeless yet interconnected perspectives on identity, investigating both the tensions and possibilities existing at global crossroads and the complexities that necessarily result.

FUTURE/PAST/PRESENCE: THE 2025 NEW HARMONY CONTEMPORARY PRINT EXCHANGE APRIL 19-MAY 10

Co-organized by John P. Begley (contemporary artist, printmaker and founding director, New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art and Printshop - 1975 through 1983) and Brett Anderson (contemporary artist, printmaker and University of Southern Indiana Associate Professor of Art and Director of USI's McCutchan Art Center and Pace Galleries) is a continuation of multiple portfolio exchanges that the New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art has hosted over its illustrious history. The invitational supports three broad goals of the gallery; by acting as a vehicle to bring contemporary art from across the nation to a rural region of the United States; by highlighting the communal ideology of the city's history by encouraging printmaking and the

portfolio exchange format; and to help secure the future of New Harmony's cultural legacy. This exhibit will feature works by over 30 artists currently living and working across eight states with ties and links to the Midwest region and Southwest Indiana in particular.

Liminal Worlds

July 12-August 23 at New Harmony Gallery of Contemporary Art (506 Main Street)

Curated by Kimi Kitada, "Liminal Worlds" considers the hybrid, multicultural identities of Asian American artists in the Midwest region through the work of seven artists. The featured artists work expansively across printmaking, sculpture, painting and moving images, including works by: Heehyun Choi, Daeun Lim, Lisa Maione, William Plummer, Skye Taniai, Heinrich Toh and Hope-Lian Vinson. Drawing on the cultural theory of Homi Bhabha's concept of hybridity, the artists' practices reference a multivocal, fluid and unfixed notion of identity. Some of the selected artists grew up in the United States, while others immigrated to the U.S. at various moments in their artistic careers. Scholar Erika Lee posits, "what does it mean to be Asian American in the Midwest?" This exhibition delves into that question by foregrounding the "in-between" spaces of cultural belonging and holding space for multiple identities at once. Curator Kimi Kitada lives and works in Kansas City, Missouri,. In addition to her work curating exhibits across the U.S. and internationally for venues in Washington, D.C.; New York, New York; Rome, Italy; Kansas City, Missouri and Budapest, Hungary.
