- 1 Atheneum - Registration/Admission/Museum Shop**
 - 2 Oxen:** Mark Hufford demonstrates how to yoke his oxen, how they respond to commands and how they were used to help clear the land using forestry tools.
 - 3 Tinsmith:** Adam Clark will be demonstrating the art of working with tin.
 - 4 Paper Marbling and Bookbinding:** John Bielik is an artisan, instructor and living history interpreter specializing in bookbinding and paper marbling.
 - 5 Spinning and Natural Dyes:** Karen Whitt will demonstrate the art of spinning fibers and dyeing them using natural dyes.
 - 6 Fur Trader:** Tony Gerard depicts a French Indian fur trader of the 1800s showing his goods, hides and furs.
 - 7 Blacksmith:** John Lovin demonstrates traditional metal working.
 - 8 Basket Weaving:** Beth Lovin shows the art of weaving baskets.
 - 9 West Street Gate (Admission)**
 - 10 Hide Tanning:** Kevin Clinton will give hide tanning demonstrations and show other primitive living skills.
 - 11 Oculus:** Jim Buchanan, an artist from Scotland, converted this pioneer cabin in New Harmony into a camera obscura – a walk-in pinhole camera.
 - 12 Candle Dipping:** People in the early 1800s made candles from animal fat in a hand-dipped process.
 - 13 Kettlecorn and Rock Candy For Sale:** Stop by for an old-fashioned treat.
 - 14 Naturalist Drawing:** Savannah Hoskinson demonstrates natural history illustration.
 - 15 1800s Doctor Presentation:** Albert Roberts gives a dramatic first person presentation that demonstrates common surgical techniques and medical practices during the early 1800s.
 - 16 Harmonist Chores:** Kelley Morgan shows students what chores they would have been doing if they were members of the Harmonist Community.
 - 17 1800s Diorama and Kids' Games and Dances:** Visit the Salomon Wolf House for kids' games and dances and a detailed diorama of the town of New Harmony.
-  **Tree of 40 Fruits:** Through the process of grafting, each tree grows over 40 different types of fruit.
