This architecturally significant building is meant to be "a place of literary and scientific learning" and is the start of our historic tours in New Harmony.	Atheneum: New Harmony's Atheneum is the visitor center for New Harmony, Indiana. It is named for the Greek Athenaion, which was a temple dedicated to Athena in ancient Greece. New Harmony's Atheneum architect was Richard Meier.
There are two circular structures in town, one sits at the south edge and the other at the north western edge, which are made of hedges or stone, and promote reflection and spiritual contemplation. What are they?	<u>Labyrinths</u> : North Western- Cathedral labyrinth South Edge- Harmonist labyrinth (hedge)

Behind the New Harmony Inn there is a sculpture titled St. Francis and the Birds. What is the story behind this sculpture?	This sculpture of St. Francis and the Birds is one of two of its kind. The twin work is located in Assisi, Italy. The theme of the work is a story of St. Francis of Assisi, the patron saint of the environment: As St. Francis journeyed with a companion, he caught sight of an array of wild birds. He ran towards them expecting them to take flight, but instead they remained calm. St. Francis began to preach, and as he spoke, the birds gazed attentively at him spreading their wings and pulling closer to his words. Upon completion of his sermon, St. Francis gave the birds a blessing and they flew off. From this day on, St. Francis would bring the word of God to many creatures.

In the winter of 1825-1826 Robert Dale Owen and William Maclure brought a large keel boat loaded with scientists, teachers, philosophers, writers and other learned people from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania to New Harmony, Indiana. They traveled from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, down the Ohio River to the mouth of the Wabash River, and then up the Wabash to New Harmony. It was arguably the largest gathering of learned people to ever assemble on a single boat and it was later dubbed A mural can be found inside the Working Men's Institute depicting this information.	The Philanthropist was the name of the keel boat and it was dubbed the "Boatload of Knowledge."
